

Through YouTube, he came to know about Narayan Seva Sansthan. On 5 January 2026, he reached out to the organisation for help. After examination, on 13 January, he was fitted with a lightweight and durable artificial limb, and he was also given three months of computer training. Mukesh says that the affection and free services provided by the organization have been a blessing for him. Today, he is once again moving forward with confidence and working towards becoming self-reliant. His story is an inspiration for all differently-abled individuals who, even in difficult circumstances, can rebuild their dreams with the right guidance and support.

Hope of Little Steps: Shajan's New Beginning

Nine-year-old Shajan Raut, who lives in the small village of Harpur in the Sitamarhi district of Bihar, was a little different from other children of his age. While his friends ran through the streets, played together, and went to school, Shajan often sat quietly in a corner of his home watching them. His eyes were full of dreams, but his legs could not support those dreams. Since birth, he had been suffering from Cerebral Palsy Spastic Paraplegia, a condition that had weakened both of his legs.

Shajan's father, Bablu Raut, worked as a daily wage labourer and somehow managed to support the family. The responsibility of Shajan's mother, Neelam Devi, and their four children rested on his shoulders. With such limited income, it was already difficult to run the household, and the cost of Shajan's treatment felt like climbing a mountain. They tried everything—from local remedies to small and big hospitals—but no permanent solution was found. Gradually, the flame of hope began to fade. Then one day,

an acquaintance told them about Narayan Seva Sansthan in Udaipur. This news came like a ray of light in their darkness.

In November 2025, they brought their son to Udaipur. There, the doctors conducted a detailed examination of Shajan and advised surgery. Between November and January, successful operations were performed on both of his legs. During the treatment, the family faced every challenge with patience and faith.

On 8 February 2026, during the follow-up visit, Shajan's plaster was removed, and he was fitted with special callipers. The doctors said, "If regular practice and proper care continue, Shajan will gradually begin to walk.."

Hearing this, tears of joy filled the eyes of his parents. After years of pain and struggle, they could finally see hope for their son's future.

Today, Shajan is stronger than before. With support, he has begun to move forward on his own feet. His smile now carries hope, confidence, and the glow of a new life. Every small step he takes tells a big story of victory for his family.

Shajan's family expresses their heartfelt gratitude to the doctors and donors of Narayan Seva Sansthan, who showed a new path to his little steps and helped his dreams take flight once again.

Currently, an advanced artificial limb with a pneumatic knee joint and carbon foot costs around ₹41,000, which is beyond the reach of many poor and rural families.

Now, through indigenous manufacturing, an important step has been taken to make the same advanced artificial limb available for around ₹10,000. This will ensure that technology is no longer limited to a few people but becomes a means of service and empowerment.

This five-year agreement between India's leading medical technology park, Andhra Pradesh MedTech Zone (AMTZ), and Narayan Seva Sansthan is not merely a formal document—it is a commitment to restore the broken confidence of millions.

Pneumatic Limb: A New Flight of Hope

Across the world, whenever advanced artificial limbs such as pneumatic limbs are discussed, the first thing that comes up is their high price. Even in developed countries, receiving such facilities free of cost is considered almost impossible. Their market price is around ₹50,000. In such a situation, when an organization provides these limbs every day, completely free of charge and with full compassion, it can truly be considered a living example of service and humanity. By the grace of God, this noble work is being continuously carried out by Narayan Seva Sansthan. At the organization's Manav Mandir Hospital, many innocent faces arrive every day with congenital physical deformities. Some have one leg shorter than the other, some have twisted feet, and some have incomplete hands—but the dreams of life are still alive in their eyes. When one such young child was fitted with a pneumatic limb for the first time, he did not just stand up—he felt the confidence hidden within him awaken again.

For him, that artificial limb was not a machine, but the return of a smile that had been lost years ago. The child's mother expressed her gratitude and blessings to the doctors of the organization with trembling hands. Tears flowing from her eyes washed away years of pain and helplessness. She knew that this service was not a display or publicity, but a sincere expression of human compassion.

An Inspiring Journey of Commitment to Service

The journey of calliper manufacturing associated with Narayan Seva Sansthan is not just a story of technical development, but a living example of service, sensitivity, and dedication.

This journey began in August 1996, when an initiative was taken to locally prepare orthoses, callipers, and splints for the rehabilitation of children and adults affected by Polio. At that time, neither modern machines nor trained technicians were available. Teaching basic techniques to local craftsmen and producing these devices was a major challenge. In the early days, metal callipers were made. They were heavy and uncomfortable to wear. Yet, for the children who learned to stand on their feet for the first time after surgery, these callipers became a new ray of hope.



Gradually, the demand increased. Many children whose legs were paralyzed but did not have deformities were able to walk with the help of callipers without needing surgery.

In 1999, the organization introduced an important change by replacing metal callipers with lighter and more comfortable plastic callipers. Around the same time, inspiration was also drawn from the Floor Reaction Orthosis (FRO) technology encouraged by India's former President and renowned scientist A. P. J. Abdul Kalam. This technology provided stability without restricting the movement of the knee, something that traditional callipers could not achieve.





As a result, many children gained better balance and greater confidence.

Over time, the organization began using low-temperature thermoplastics and modern composite materials, making callipers lighter, stronger, and more effective. Today, Narayan Seva Sansthan provides orthoses to dozens of children and adults every day, helping them move toward a self-reliant life.

This story is not merely about making devices; it is about the smiles that return when someone stands on their feet for the first time. Here, callipers do not just provide support—they become the beginning of self-respect and a new life.

Where Dreams Build an Empowered Future

“Leelavati Rathi Manav Mandir”
Four Decades of Service Journey
For differently-abled people coming from the remote regions of India, the mission of service, medical care, and rehabilitation was started four decades ago by Narayan Seva Sansthan. From its headquarters in Udaipur, this service journey has today become a symbol of hope and confidence across the country.



Located in the Islamiya Bazaar area of Hyderabad, the capital of Telangana, “Leelavati Rathi Manav Mandir” has been dedicated to the service of differently-abled people since 2004. After renovation in 2023, this centre has emerged in a stronger form with modern facilities. Here, treatment is not limited only to physical deformities, but extends to self-respect and future building.

Strong Steps Towards Self-Reliance

The organization believes that true rehabilitation is completed only through self-reliance. With this objective, 45-day self-employment-oriented training programs are conducted here.

Thousands of Hands Joined in Service

Behind the success of this centre are thousands of service-minded hands. Some gave their time – some gave resources – some gave compassion. Through free medical and artificial limb camps, thousands of needy people have benefited. Those who once walked with the support of others are now making their own path.

Artificial Limbs Become Pillars of Hope – 900 Differently-abled People Will Stand

Measurement Camps in Delhi and Hyderabad

Recently, free artificial limb and calliper measurement camps were organised by Narayan Seva Sansthan in Delhi and Hyderabad for the benefit of differently-abled people. In these camps, the organization's Prosthetic and Orthotics Team took measurements for the manufacturing of 861 artificial limbs (hands and legs) and 116 callipers. In both camps, assistive devices were also distributed to needy differently-abled people who had come from distant areas.

A camp organised on 11 January at Purusharth Hari Mandir in GTB Nagar, Delhi, saw the participation of 180 differently-abled people. Out of them, measurements were taken for 116 artificial limbs for 110 individuals and 46 callipers.

The Chief Guest was D. C. Joshi from Shriram Pistons & Rings Ltd. The program was presided over by Mahesh Kumar of NGCL. Distinguished guests included Ajay Mittal, Abhishek Kumar, Suresh Chandak, Hemant Sudan, and D. C. Goyal.

The guests also distributed wheelchairs and other assistive devices to the needy. For free corrective surgery for congenital disabilities, 10 differently-abled individuals were selected.

In the arrangement of the camp, support was provided by Jagan Singh Bhati, Krishnavatar, Satyanarayan, and Ramesh Kumar from Fatehpuri Ashram; Ved Prakash and Pravanjan Sahu from Rohini Ashram; Rahul Bhatnagar from Janakpuri Ashram; and Bhanwar Singh Rathore from





Hyderabad (Telangana)

At the Narayan Artificial Limb and Calliper Measurement Camp organised on 1 February at Minerva Garden, Champapet Sagar Road in Hyderabad, more than 950 differently-abled people from nearby villages and areas benefited.

The Chief Guest of the camp was Rakesh Sharma, Finance Manager of Yash Resources Recycling Pvt. Ltd., who described the organization's service projects for the differently-abled and the poor as a divine mission.

The program was presided over by Alka Chaudhary, the local branch coordinator of Narayan Seva Sansthan. Distinguished guests included Aruna Agrawal, Meena Chakkikar, Subhash Agrawal, Abhay Chaudhary, and Anil Bajpai.

In the camp, measurements were taken for 745 artificial limbs for 693 differently-abled individuals and 70 callipers for 52 individuals. The guests also distributed wheelchairs to 15 needy people.

For corrective disability surgery, 10 differently-abled individuals were selected by Dr. Manas Ranjan Sahu and Dr. Dhumit Prajapati.

Palak Agarwal, Director of Mahagangotri at Narayan Seva Sansthan, welcomed the guests by presenting traditional turbans (pag), shawls, and mementoes, while also



sharing information about the organization's free service projects and the service plan for the next five years. She informed that another camp will soon be organised where the selected differently-abled brothers and sisters will receive artificial limbs and callipers prepared according to their measurements.

The program was conducted by Mahim Jain and Prabhudas.
